


#### Hello folks

Thank you for your donations which are in the yellow envelopes waiting to go to Southwark Cathedral.



#### **BUCKLAND BELLRINGERS**

How do you celebrate May morning? The old village traditions included May Queen processions, Morris Dancing, and Maypole dancing on the green. We have seen Maypole dancing on the green at Buckland during the May Fayre and have rung the bells at the start of this village event. In Oxford thousands of people gather early in the morning on



1st May near Magdalen College to hear the choir sing from the roof of the bell tower. Once the clock has struck 6am, the choir sings, and then the bells are rung. Several bell towers across the city join in.

There are Morris dancers in the street, and the roads are filled with people. Some people have been up all night celebrating, especially the students who have attended May balls. The choir sings a 17th century hymn in Latin - The Hymnus Eucharisticus, or Te Deum Patrem Colimus, praising God the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. The first verse is:

Te Deum Patrem colimus, Te laudibus prosequimur, Qui corpus cibo reficis, Cælesti mentem gratia. We worship you, O God the Father, we offer you our praise, for you nourish our bodies, and minds with heavenly grace.

After this early start, colleges provide special May morning breakfasts for the students. It is worth getting up early to continue this 500 year old traditional start to the month of May.


# **Buckland Matters**

#### **BUCKLAND PARISH COUNCIL UPDATE**

#### **Annual Parish Meeting**

If you attended the 2025 Annual Parish Meeting, thank you for participating and we hope you enjoyed the evening.

We started the meeting with a short address from our Chair, Nigel Husband, followed by an update from lanthe Cox on potential development at both Gatwick and Heathrow Airports and impending changes to the use of airspace across the south-east of England.



Our Chair took the opportunity to express thanks to the Betchworth and Buckland Society for fund-

ing the purchase of a new flagpole for the village green, to Buckland Estate who have offered to assist with preparing the ground for its installation and to Alan Brindley for agreeing to continue as our Volunteer Flag Warden. It is hoped the flagpole will be installed in advance of the 80<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of D Day.

Our topical item for the evening was Devolution with a particular focus on the UK Government wish to see our County Council and the eleven Borough and District Councils across Surrey restructured as Unitary Councils. Helyn Clack, our SCC Councillor provided us with a clear outline of the process that has been set out by the UK Government, explained what this has meant so far and gave us an idea, based upon what has emerged to date, as to likely next steps. A lively interactive session followed during which views were expressed, queries were raised, and concerns were noted.

Draft minutes for the meeting will be available to download from the village website by the end of April and will be displayed on the parish council notice-board opposite the village shop in early May.

# GARDENING NOTES May - Colour your world with bedding plants

For the ultimate splash of colour this summer, add annual bedding plants to your pots and borders. Just a few will make all the difference to your outside space; from a large garden to a balcony with a few pots and a window box, get planting now to enjoy a summer of colourful cheerfulness.

Bedding plants do need regular watering, feeding and dead-heading. This is no chore in the summer months, especially if watering in the early morning or the cooler evening hours. Regular maintenance will pay huge dividends, with vigorous growth and plentiful flowers.

The choice is wide and varied. Geraniums are amongst the easiest and most popular – they are forgiving in hot and dry conditions and are recommended for those who maybe only water once or twice a week. There are both upright and trailing (ivy-leaf) varieties, so are well-suited for hanging baskets. Top up baskets with trailing lobelia, surfinia, verbena and scaevola. Add slow-release feed and water-retaining gel to fresh compost when planting for long-lasting blooms. For impact in pots and borders, nemesia are a wonderful start. Delicately scented, they are available in many colours and with varieties such as Wisley Vanilla, Banana Split, and Rhubarb and Custard, they can be difficult to resist! Others to consider are osteospermum, marigolds and ever-popular cheerful cosmos.

For shady areas, begonias of all types will tolerate less sun: non-stop (upright large-flowered bush), illumination (trailing) and bedding (compact bush) varieties all have succulent foliage which is protected by not being over-exposed to hot sun. Likewise, bush busy lizzies (impatiens) and the larger New Guinea busy lizzies will thrive and be easier to maintain in a North-facing position.

Enjoy the impact fast-growing and free-flowering bedding plants bring to any outdoor space.

# ST. JAMES THE LEAST OF ALL On why people should ALWAYS sit in the same pew

My dear Nephew Darren

I have to say that the couple who complained that you never noticed they had been missing from church for a month had a point. There is a simple way of noticing when someone is absent: everyone sits in the same pew. Every Sunday. Always.



Little Miss Margison sits in the pew after the third pillar on the right here at St James the Least. As she walks up the aisle, you can sense her counting the pillars until she reaches the right one, which then allows her to sit in front of it. I have speculated that if I ever had that pillar removed, then the following Sunday, she would have a complete mental collapse. One Sunday a visiting family arrived early and sat down; three people in an empty church seating 200. Colonel Wainwright and his wife were the first of our regulars to arrive and froze in horror. The Colonel said in a deafening whisper to his wife: "There's someone sitting in our pew." At least they had the grace – no matter how reluctant – for one week, to sit somewhere else. Unlike the Prentice family of husband, wife and three children, who arrived to discover that a visiting family of husband, wife and four children were sitting in their pew; six people in a pew that held eight. Or, it normally holds eight. That Sunday, it held thirteen.

We at least have one iconoclast in Miss Pemberton, who makes a point of sitting in a different place every week. This thoroughly unsettles the rest of the congregation, who fear she may sit in their seats during her nomadic wanderings. I sometimes wonder if she has a chart at home with all the pew spaces marked on it and she strikes one off each week as she returns home after Mattins. Occasionally the unexpected can happen. Mrs Cholmondeley arrived one week in good time, settled herself in her accustomed place, but half-way through the Service suddenly ran out of the building. Ten minutes later, she was back and in her usual place once again. It was only when the church filled with the smell of burned bacon that we understood. That is why replacing pews with chairs in your church was a mistake. Pews can never be moved. You know where everybody is – or should be!

# Small Surrey Churches - Part Three

# Lumley Chapel, Cheam



- Surprisingly suburban setting
- Impressive sixteenth century carvings and plaster work
- Beautifully peaceful

The Lumley Chapel is an unassuming building in the centre of suburban Cheam. It is the oldest building in Cheam. It was formerly the chancel of the medieval parish church of Cheam, owned at the Norman Conquest by the Archbishop and monks of Canterbury. The dedication is to St Dunstan, the Archbishop from AD 960-988). Some of the stonework in the current building survives from that original building, over 900 years old.

Lord John Lumley lived at Nonsuch Palace in neighbouring Ewell, which had been built for Henry VIII, though it was incomplete when he died in 1547. In 1556 Queen Mary I sold it to Henry Fitzalan, the 19th Earl of Arundel, who completed it by 1559. The Earl of Arundel's family owned large swathes of Sussex and Surrey, including Buckland, and their family wealth was very substantial. Henry Fitzalan's daughter and his son-in-law, John Lumley, 1st Baron Lumley, also lived at Nonsuch Palace following their marriage in 1550 until 1592, when he sold the palace back to Elizabeth I and the Crown, in exchange for lands valued at £534.

The Palace was demolished in 1683. No trace of the palace remains on its site today, but some artifacts are held by the British Museum.<sup>2</sup>

Having obtained private ownership of this Chapel in the 1590's Lord Lumley restored the building, retaining as much of the ancient stone walls as possible. He added a larger East window and changed the wooden roof into a an ornate, coved plaster ceiling. The plasterwork still bears the date 1592 on the central pendant.<sup>3</sup> Lord Lumley then commissioned three marble and alabaster carved monuments, embellished with gold-leaf details to honour his first wife, Jane Fitzalan (1537-1578), himself (1533-1609) and his second wife Elizabeth who survived him, dying in 1617. The carvings decorating the tombs are all in deep three-dimensional relief and considered to be by an Italian artist.<sup>3</sup> The carvings are set against architectural backgrounds, including an arch and obelisk know to have been erected in the Privy Garden at Nonsuch Palace. Despite the tiny size of the Chapel (9m x 6m), there are about a dozen or so chairs, and an altar beneath the ornate ceiling.

In addition to the three family tombs and monuments, there are over 30 or so marble wall-plaque memorials commemorating other wealthy and aristocratic residents of Cheam and the local area, which were relocated here when the adjoining church was demolished in 1864. There are also some relocated brass memorials set in stone, dating from the 14th and 15th centuries.

The church of St Dunstan's that used to adjoin this Chapel was largely rebuilt in 1747, but the Chapel 'was retained with minor repairs'. That church only survived until 1864, when it was demolished, but again this Chapel was saved. The new church of St Dunstan's which is there today, was built in 1864 was on a different footprint about 10 metres to the north of this building, leaving the Lumley Chapel standing alone.

One of the most thorough descriptions of the Lumley Chapel is an academic paper of 14 pages, in the Transactions of the Ancient Monuments Society from 1954.<sup>3</sup> By a quirk of coincidence, this paper was written by Herbert Dunk, who earlier in his life, was the Rector at St Mary's Buckland from 1925 to 1937.

The Lumley Chapel was restored in the 1950's by 'The Churches Conservation Trust', who have continued to maintain it in very good order. Visiting is encouraged, and that itself is an experience. First you much check the opening times of Cheam Library! (currently staffed Wednesday & Thursday, 9-5). It is there you can ask the Librarian for the key to the Lumley Chapel, which they will politely hand-over, and you walk the short distance to unlock the Chapel yourself. There is no charge. There are seldom any other visitors and you will find a haven of peace. It is a well kept secret, despite being recognised in several local guides, including The Arts Society's '50 Treasures of the Surrey Hills' <sup>4</sup>

Lumley Chapel is in the 'Conservation Area' of Cheam, which also includes 'Whitehall' (above), a timber framed house built about 1500, now run as a museum and cafe. This is also worth a visit. The museum has limited opening hours: currently Thursdays and Fridays 10am - 4pm, and Saturdays 12pm - 4pm. The coffee shop within is open Monday to Friday 10am -4pm. It is managed by a charity for adults with learning disabilities. I understand that Whitehall also holds a key for the Lumley Chapel, if the library is closed! Opening times may change so do check online before you travel (ref.5).

### Report on the Kew Gardens Talk

Our second talk of the year by Pamela Holt, we learnt some interesting facts about the history of Kew Gardens. It was George III's mother Princess Augusta who founded the original botanic garden at Kew in 1759. I always wondered why 'Kew Gardens' is plural and not singular? In 1772, King George III inherited the Kew estate and joined it with the royal estate in Richmond – two gardens became one.

Underneath the Palm House lie the remains of railway tunnels. They were used to transport fuel for heating the glasshouse, with carts of coal being pulled by hand along the route. These long tunnels were also built to carry smoke away from the glasshouse boilers. Rather than ruin the beautiful aesthetic of the building by adding chimneys to the design, a smokestack connected to the tunnels and disguised as an Italianate bell tower, was located near the Palm House Pond.

No names were mentioned, but it raised great laughter. I can't think why?




